





A new food cart park is all the rage in Happy Valley located just outside of downtown Portland. This new Park is said to be one of the biggest in Oregon featuring 26 unique food cart serving a variety of delicious, tasty treats. With an over 4000 square-foot pavilion as well as a massive awning will be the home of Portland's newest attraction.



25 spots were immediately filled with a 26th spot going to the contest winner of the food cart giveaway. Congratulations to Cindy Lou's for winning the 26th spot! The Happy Valley Station had its grand opening celebration on Saturday, December 5 and by now, most of the food cart owners have worked the kinks out of their preparation and service. They've now had about six weeks to prep and plan, serve and create some of the tastiest dishes in Portland.

Locale and Set Up

Located at 13551 SE. 145th Ave. in Happy Valley just off of SE. Sunnyside Rd., the Happy Valley Station is open seven days a week starting at 10:00 AM until 8:00 PM. Just a few of the food carts are open at 7:00 AM and the covered, heated 150-seat dining pavilion also opens at 7 AM. The Pavilion offers picnic benches, tables, parking and restrooms. The food carts are positioned horseshoe style around three sides of the Pavilion, primarily outside under a covered awning with three carts on the inside. There are 6 big screen TVs and a kid's play area. The idea is to purchase food outside and come inside to eat it.



Tasty Bites

Some of Portland's best eateries are showcased at the station including Cajun Life, Leid Back Hawaiian, E-San Thai and the 30 Taps beer cart with literally 30 different beers on tap ready to go and 15 ciders. Future plans may involved "tap takeovers" and guest brewers.

There's something for everyone a Happy Valley including Chinese food, Cajun cooking, chicken wings, tamales, coffee and gelato and even I Candy, a food car completely dedicated to candy. Lots of cool choices! You can enjoy Wasabi Sushi, seafood, and Mama's Mini Donuts.

Rave Reviews

Happy Valley Station already has over 49 reviews on Yelp their first month in business.



"Like all Portlanders, I love me some food carts, so much so than when we went to Hawaii and found some there, we pretty much only ate there. Most food carts all share the same characteristics, they're known for their food and not for their fine dining ambiance. Something that I'd never expect, you know what you're getting with food carts, we are all okay with this.

When I walked into the HVS, I was blown away by the fact that it brought together not only great selections for food carts but it also paired it with an amazing seated experience for after you picked up your orders. I'm used to more of the *find any place you can find to perch, even if it's not meant for perching* sort of situation, or I'm lucky, hunger game sprinting to a wobbly plastic picnic table. I've seen some food cart pods stepping it up lately but not to this scale."

This is how Happy Valley does food carts. Great set up!

The location has a rich back story. The developer originally purchased the land in 2010, fed up with local food options (shocking for Portland) and wanted to offer good food, close to home without going to Portland. It was originally zoned office so owner Valerie Hunter changed that to Commercial under a specialty restaurant.



CCC HORTICULTURE DEPARTMENT OFFERS VARIETY OF WINTER PROGRAMS

News Release from **Clackamas Community College** Downloadable file: Greenhouse Lighting and Heating variety of workshops for home gardeners, as well as classes for professional licensing. A roundup of short courses and workshops during winter term 2016 follows:

- * Fruit Tree Pruning: Saturday, Feb. 6, 9 to 11:50 a.m. at the CCC Home Orchard Society Arboretum. Demonstration and practice of pruning methods appropriate for a variety of fruit trees. Bring pruning tools and appropriate outdoor wear. Fee is \$10.
- * **Beekeeping School**: Saturdays, Feb. 6 and 14, 9 a.m. to 2:15 p.m. in Clairmont, room 118. Beekeeping is popular because of its importance in pollination and honey production. This workshop will prepare new and beginner beekeepers with knowledge, demonstrations and lists of resources. Topics will include basic bee biology, proper equipment, handling of bees, hive pest and disease control, and feeding. Cost is \$50.
- * Greenhouse Lighting and Heating: Friday, Feb. 12, 9 to 11:50 a.m. in Clairmont, room 117. Supplemental lighting and heating are two of the most costly greenhouse inputs and selecting the right combination will have a lasting impact on plant health and profitability. Topics include an introduction to types of lighting and heating systems, energy management systems, how to decide what works best for each situation and how to access grants to support energy efficiency. Cost is \$30.
- * Irrigation for Small Farms: Tuesdays, Feb. 16 and 23, 8 to 10:30 a.m. in Clairmont, room 118. This workshop will provide a foundation for small-scale farmers to make informed decisions about irrigation systems that efficiently and cost-effectively supply the right amount of water to crops. Topics include understanding water sources, selecting the right irrigation material and developing strategies for maximizing production, while minimizing water and labor use. Cost is \$30.
- * Storm Water Management for Landscapers: Thursday, Feb. 18, 8 to 11:50 a.m. in Clairmont, room 127. This workshop focuses on proper design, maintenance and operational considerations for storm water facilities, including rain gardens and swales, to ensure water quality goals. Regulatory, contractor and designer perspectives will be addressed. LCB CEH credits available. Cost is \$40.
- * Fruit Tree Grafting Beginning: Saturday, Feb. 27, 9 to 10:30 a.m. or Saturday, Feb. 27, 10:45 a.m. to 12:15 p.m. in Clairmont, room 117. Hands-on explanation and practice in whip grafting of fruit trees under the supervision of experienced grafters. Participants will be provided with a rootstock and scion wood. Bring a straight-edged knife. Cost is \$15.
- * Fruit Tree Grafting Intermediate: Saturday, Feb. 27, 12:45 to 2:15 p.m., in Clairmont, room 117. Hands-on practice with advanced grafting methods: cleft, kerf, bark and inarching. Participants will be provided with a rootstock and scion wood. Bring a straight-edged knife. Cost is \$15.
- * **Hypertufa Trough**: Saturday, March 5, 10 to 11:50 a.m. in Clairmont, room 117. Hypertufa containers -- or troughs -- make natural additions to the garden as well as handsome homes for alpine plants on a patio, deck or balcony. These containers can be made in nearly any shape and size. Learn to make one and about the appropriate plants and soils to use. Cost is \$35.
- * Japanese-style Pruning: Saturday, March 12, 8 to 11:50 a.m. in Clairmont, room 118. Learn the art of Japanese pruning with Masa Mizuno, a highly respected master of Japanese garden cultivation. This is a handson class; bring gloves and pruning tools. Cost is \$40.
- * **Pesticide Laws and Safety in Spanish**: Fridays, Jan. 15 through Feb. 12, 1 to 4:50 p.m. in Clairmont, room 133. Prepare and test for the Oregon Pesticide Laws and Safety exam. Cost is \$120.
- * **Pesticide Core Training**: Friday, Feb. 26, 1 to 4:50 p.m. in Clairmont, room 133. This training qualifies for four CORE recertification credits as required by Oregon Department of Agriculture.
